Summer School Funding Quick Guide

Houghton Mifflin Harcourt[®] is your trusted partner for funding information to support summer school initiatives. As the new Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) begins to take shape across the country and in your state, we will be working to support you with new information around implementation and alignment to our programs and services.

For summer 2017, the chart below reflects current Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) grant information with links to specific title programs. Federal grants funded under ESEA flow to State Education Agencies (SEAs) by formula, then to eligible Local Education Agencies (LEAs). Some of the grants are also made available to Community-Based Organizations (CBOs) and nonprofit entities, as well as to local school districts. The grants may be applied separately or in combination to support various components of a schoolbased summer learning program.

Program	Assistance Type	Summer Learning Activities
ESEA – Title I, Part A	Formula grants to SEAs and then LEAs	LEAs target the Title I funds they receive to schools with the highest percentages of children from low-income families. These funds can support a wide variety of uses, including summer programs to extend and reinforce the regular school curriculum.
ESEA – School Improvement Grants (SIG)	Formula grants to SEAs and then competitive grants to LEAs	LEAs use SIG funds to provide adequate resources in order to substantially raise the achievement of students in their lowest- performing schools, which can include extended learning time and summer programming.
ESEA – Title II, Part A	Formula grants to SEAs and then formula grants to LEAs	LEAs may use funds to recruit and retain highly qualified teachers and for professional development activities for teachers and principals.
ESEA – 21 st -Century Community Learning Centers	Formula grants to SEAs, then competitive grants to LEAs, CBOs, and other public and private entities	Each eligible entity that receives an award from the state may use the funds to carry out a broad array of extended learning time activities before and after school and during intersession and summer recess periods.
ESEA – Title I, Part C – Education of Migratory Children	Formula grants to states	Funds must be used for the specific purpose of educating migrant children and can be applied to summer learning.
