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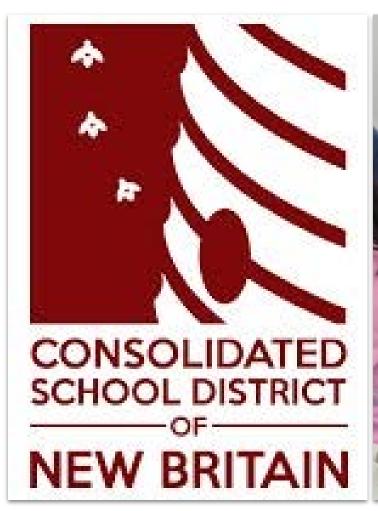

# The Problem 3+ Years Ago

#### Time to Read & Write

Students needed time to read and write daily in a variety of genres: poetry, narrative, expository, and argument.

#### Writing Declined

When we stopped monitoring writing, it declined in quality & quantity.

#### Teacher Learning

Time for teachers to learn collaboratively was almost nonexistent.

#### **Different Expectations**

Expectations vastly different from teacher to teacher and school to school.



Teaching writing not only improves how well students write, but it also enhances a student's ability to read a text.

# Why Argument?

CCR skills & Social Studies/Next Gen Science Standards included argument writing in science, social studies, and ELA.

Many teachers were teaching argument differently - inconsistent class to class.

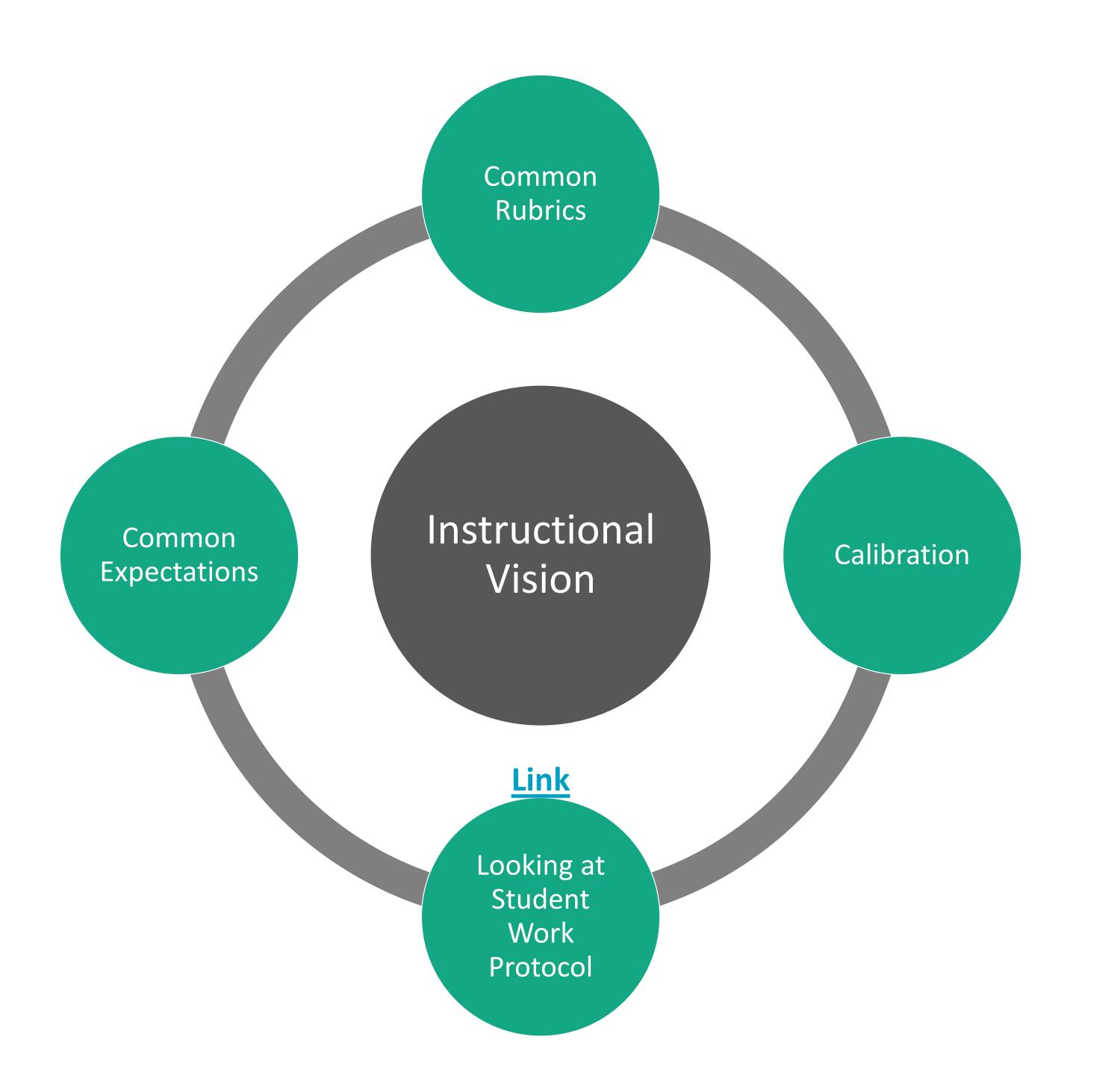

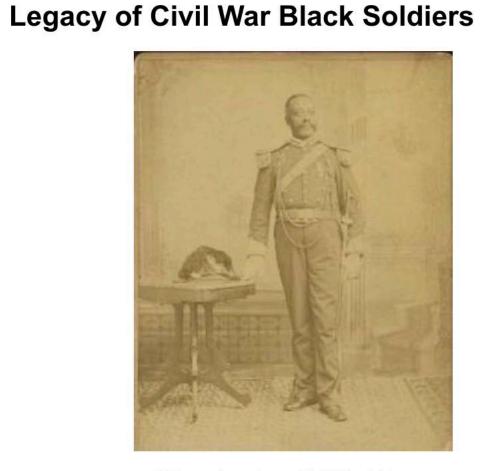

Shortly after the school shooting in Parkland, Fla., President Trump said that violent video games and movies may play a role in school shootings, a claim that has been made — and rejected — many times since the increase in such attacks in the past two decades.

Movies are "so violent," Mr. Trump said at a meeting on school safety on Feb. 22, a week after the massacre at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School, where, the authorities say, a former student, Nikolas Cruz, killed 17 people with a semiautomatic rifle. A neighbor of Mr. Cruz's told The Miami Herald that he played video games, often violent ones, for up to 15 hours a day.

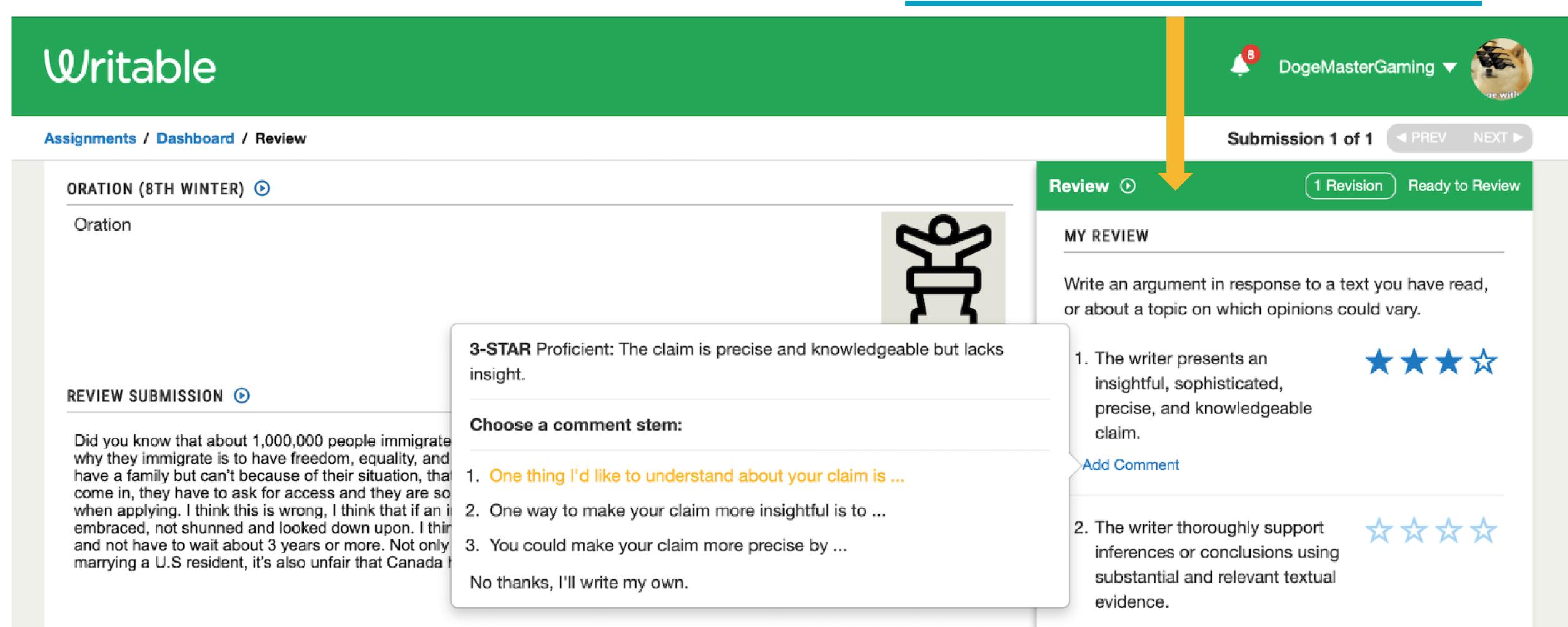

## The Original Rubric

# Peer, self, and teacher review checklists & comment stems



## Anonymous, Structured, & Authentic

The writer presents an insightful, sophisticated, precise, and knowledgeable claim.

ALICE B: "You have a decent claim, but are you saying that football should continue or there has to be contact rules so football can be safer. You have to be more specific. I don't want to be misguided and forget that football shouldn't be played."

The writer provides an insightful and thought-provoking analysis of the topic/text, and uses valid and persuasive reasoning to connect evidence with the claim.

SAMUEL W: "The commentary isn't as thought provoking as the evidence is. I suggest that you get opinionated and try to really focus on the commentary specific to each piece of evidence. Also, remember that this is a text meant to read. Write it like it is meant to be read."

The writer organizes the claims, counterclaims, reasons, and evidence to thoroughly develop the argument, using a purposeful and logical progression of ideas from beginning to end.

FAITH G: "Your essay might flow better if you put the paragraphs where you put your own opinion or what you support first then get into the paragraphs that discuss the negative sides to football which was your first and second paragraphs."

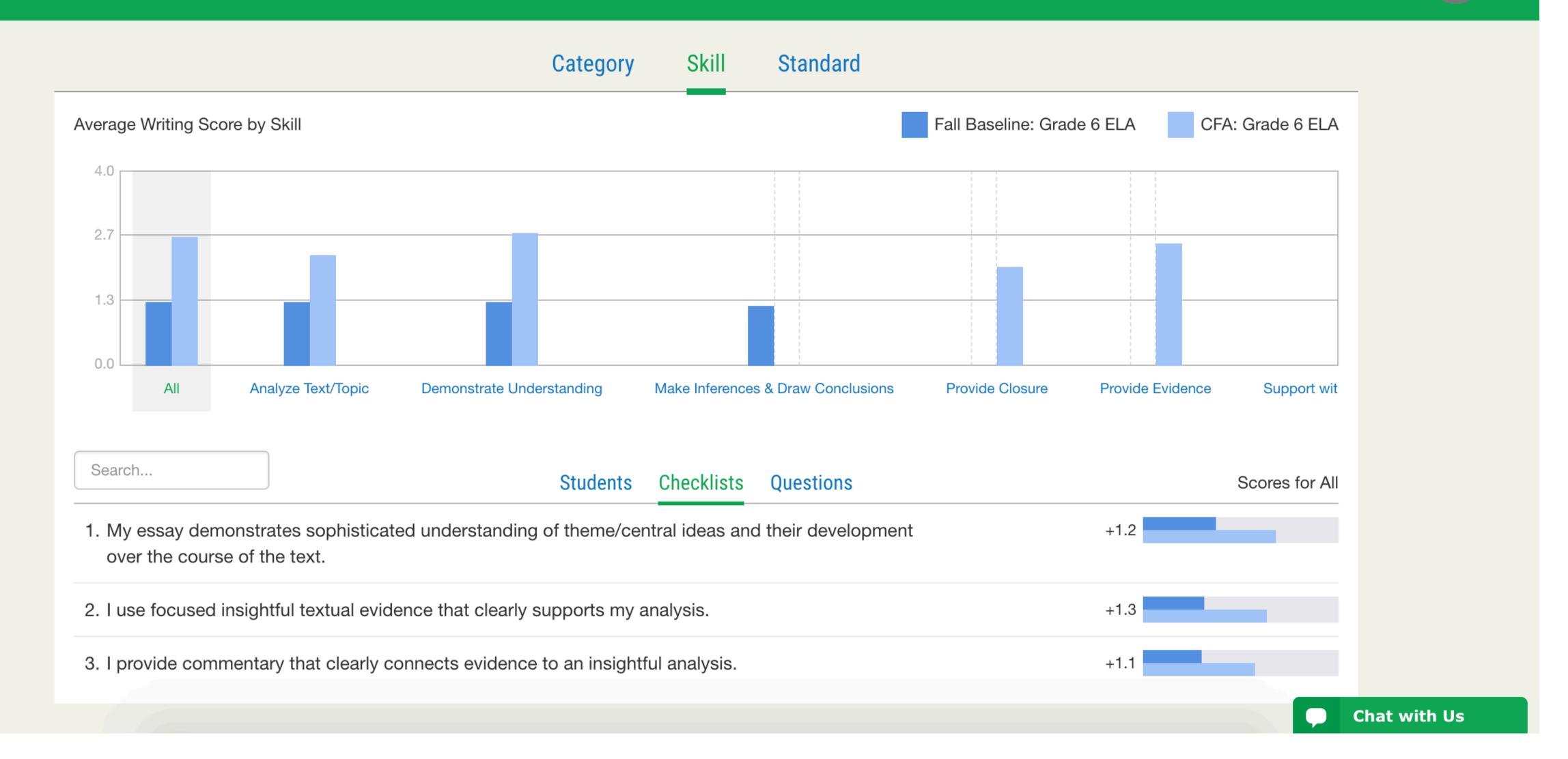
